## **CONCEPT AND OBJECTIVES**

This Regional Dialogue on Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) is co-organized by the UN Development Programme (UNDP), the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) Secretariat, the International Partnership on Mitigation & MRV, and the Partnership for Market Readiness. It is hosted by the Government of Costa Rica and supported by a number of donors. The dialogue will convene government representatives from the Latin America & Caribbean region and international organizations/experts involved in NDC implementation.

The dialogue will seek to accomplish the following objectives:

- To take stock of submitted (I)NDCs from the region, NDC-related provisions in the Paris Agreement, and implications for national implementation;
- To discuss next steps in preparing for NDC implementation at the national level, including possible guidance and tools;
- To provide a forum for exchanging country experiences and perspectives on planning for NDC implementation, including envisioned challenges and support needs; and
- To discuss key technical and institutional issues related to NDC implementation (strengthening
  institutional arrangements, designing implementation plans, developing systems to monitor
  progress toward NDC goals, mobilizing resources, etc.) in plenary sessions and through smaller
  breakout sessions.

Session 2:	Implementing Adaptation Actions in the Context of NDCs
	A majority of countries submitted adaptation components as part of their INDCs in order to catalyze climate-resilient development and address climate risk. Achieving the adaptation goals and visions laid out in countries' INDCs requires translating goals into concrete policies, programs, and projects. This session will discuss designing/strengthening National Adaptation Plans (NAPs) in the context of NDC implementation, links with national development strategies, and challenges of monitoring and evaluation frameworks for adaptation actions. It will also discuss experiences in establishing national coordination systems; identifying and prioritizing adaptation measures with government counterparts and other stakeholders; conducting technical analysis relating to implementing adaptation options; and potential links with mitigation in certain sectors.
